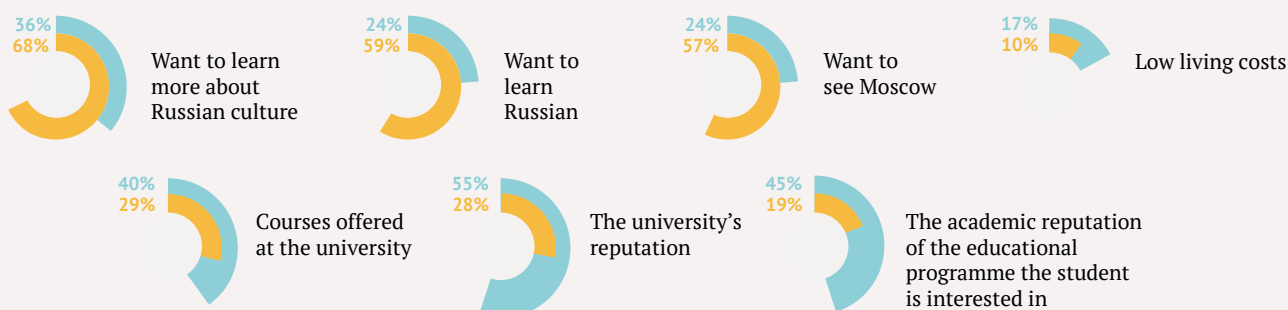

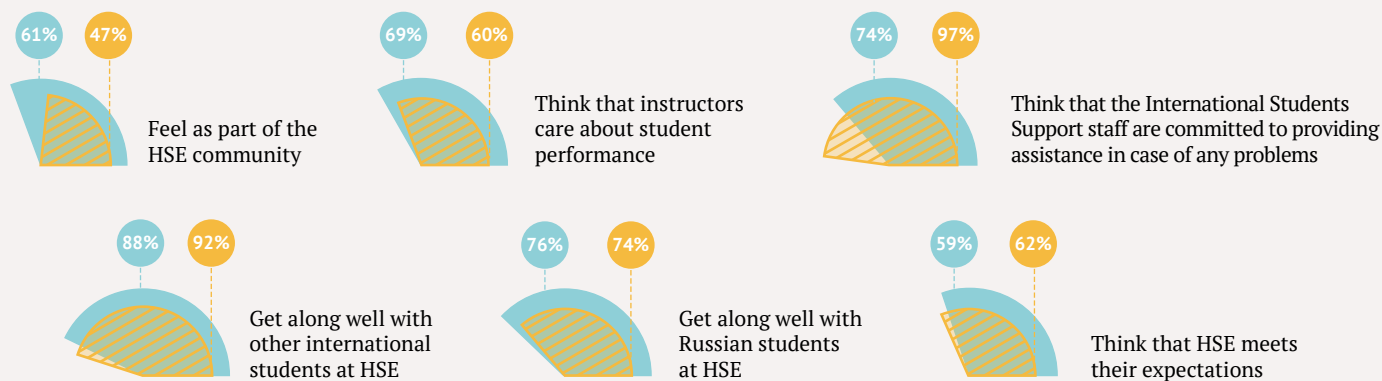

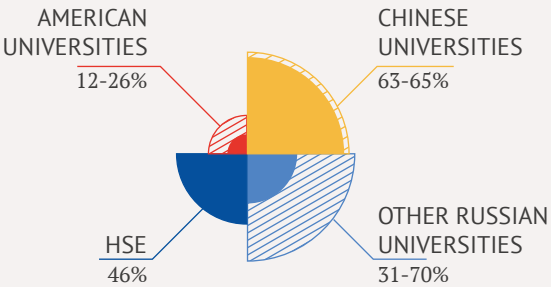

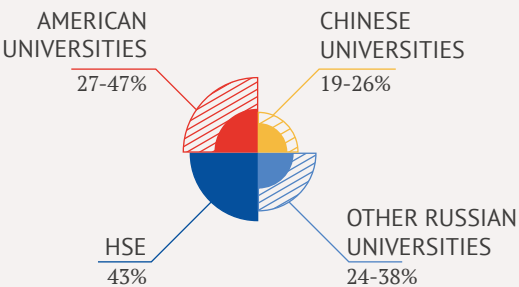
STUDENTS AND THEIR EXPERIENCE: A COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS

One of the best ways of learning is to compare different things. The following two projects – “Student Experience in the Research University” (SERU-I) and “Student Trajectories and Experience at Russian Universities” – analyze the experiences of undergraduate and specialist level students in leading universities in the USA, China and Russia. All students were able to answer the same questions, thus, allowing us to compare HSE students with those of 20 universities in the USA, three universities in China, and 11 universities in Russia.

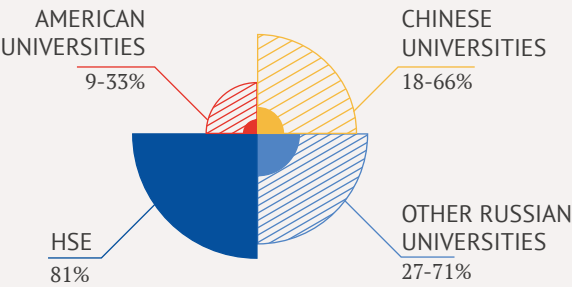

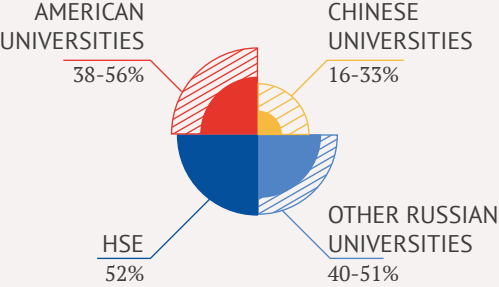

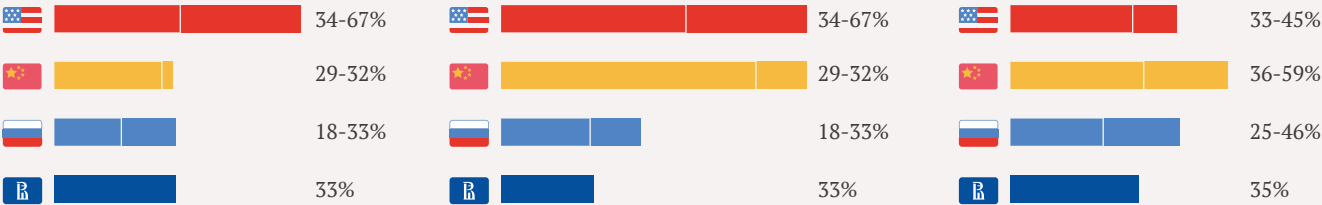

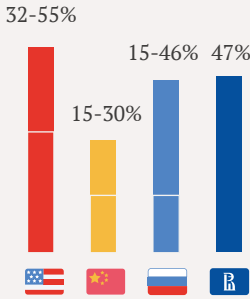

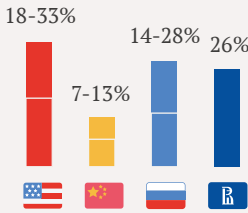

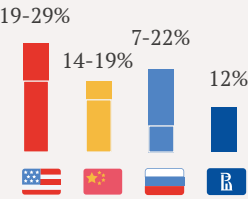

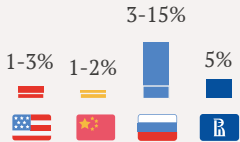

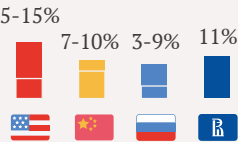

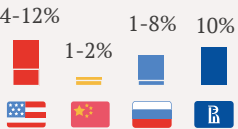

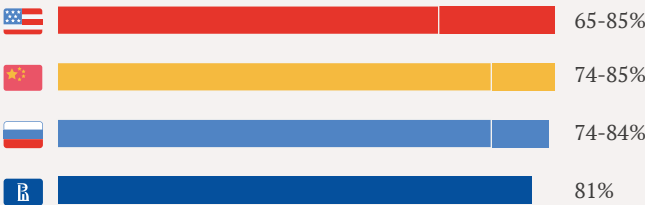

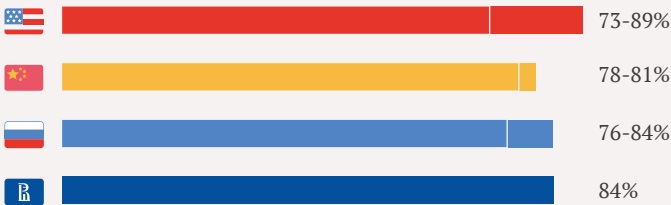

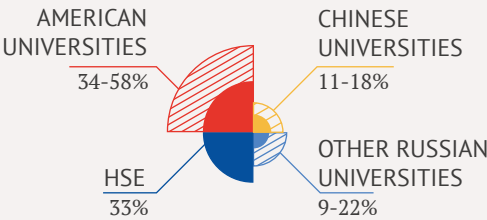


Give high marks to the teaching quality of general courses

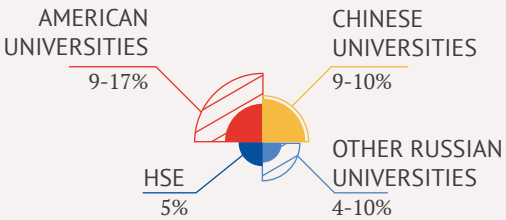


Give high marks to the teaching quality of courses within their specialisation

Communicated with a faculty member personally, by phone, or by e-mail

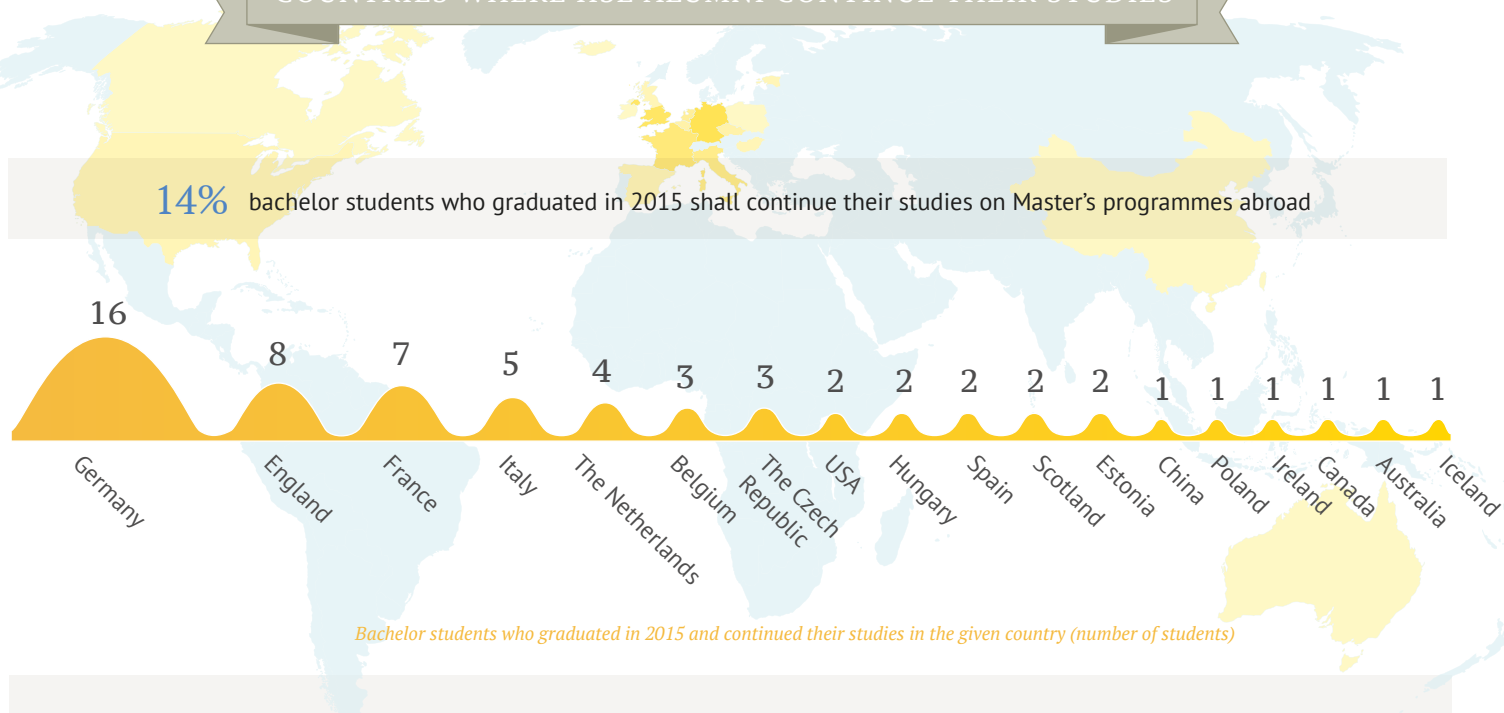


Worked with a faculty member on an activity other than coursework (e.g., student organization, campus committee, cultural activity)

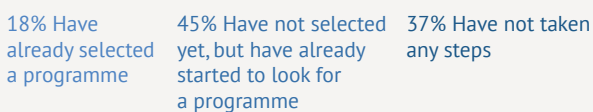
PARTICIPATION OF HSE STUDENTS IN INTERNATIONAL MOBILITY PROGRAMMES¹



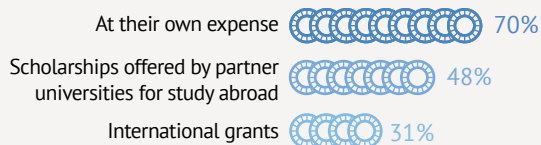
HAVE PLANS TO STUDY ABROAD ON A LONG-TERM PROGRAMME DURING THEIR STUDIES AT HSE



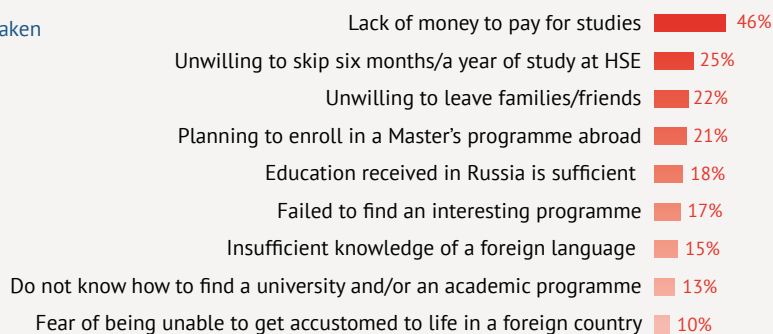
